

Each year has seen the "Big D" show grow in size and popularity. It is now ranked as one of the largest Appaloosa Horse Shows held in Texas. The very first Registered Appaloosa Horse Sale was held in conjunction with the third "Big D" show in 1959. Since then we have seen numerous, and profitable Appaloosa horse sales held in this state.

So we folks, who raise, show, and talk Appaloosa Horses, really owe Dan Coates, a very big and sincere, thank you for hours of hard work in planning, managing, and producing these shows, so that the rest of us may have the pleasure of showing, selling, and seeing these fine Appaloosa horses.
