must have caught up with her as she was past 18 years so there will not be another Blue Chip or Mr. Blue, Dutch Eagle or Blue J. She had a stud colt by her side at the time she died sired by American Eagle, but he has no color or characteristics and is aptly named "Doubtful Blue". It is doubtful he will ever color which brings to an end a winning combination of bloodlines whose cumulative winnings very possibly surpass that of any other Appaloosa bloodline. This was a mare . . .

Red Eagle's Peacock is the sire of the leopard stallion Peacock's Miraklman, of whom Claude Thompson has been quoted as saying, "This stallion, Peacock's Miraklman, is perhaps the greatest of his entire breeding career, and without any doubt, should be the very greatest sire of the entire group". Miraklman is living up to his expectations by being the sire of Med-O-Vanity T-37,300, the 1965 Northwest Champion Halter Mare, and Med-O-Scamp T-37,301, the 1966 Northwest Champion Halter Stallion, who has gone on to prove that in performance he can be just at tough.

The amazing prepotency of the Red Eagle Line is not limited to the stallions already mentioned but can be characterized by still others. Simcoe's Chinook F-1610 was the first foal produced by the mare Maize F-1643 for Martin and Grace Forry of the Simcoe Stables located at Goldendale, Wash. It was in 1951 that the Forry's went to the National Show at Lewiston, Idaho, and decided to breed Maize to nothing less than the Grand Champion Stallion. That year it was Red Eagle F-209, owned by Claude Thompson, who stood the stallion at his ranch at Moro, Ore.

Should Simcoe's Chinook have been born solid instead of a beautiful blue roan with white blanket, the legend of the Simcoe Stables would not be. Chinook was sold in 1954 at the National Show at Deer Lodge, Mont., to Jack Johnson of Waco, Texas, and went on to become a top cutting horse and the 1958 National Reserve Champion Perforamnce Horse and sire of Simcoe's Sarcee F-1634, the Champion two-year old stallion at the 1957 National and winner of the most coveted Appaloosa award, the Bearstep Katouche. It was that year that saw Red Eagle Reserve Champion Stallion and American Marvel F-1597 Reserve Champion Mare. Simcoe's Sarcee was then sold to Peterson's Lazy F Ranch at Atkinson, Nebr., and since then has become a top notch performance and cutting horse. One of his colts, sired by him as a two-year old, is the leopard Simcoe's Snowy Rock F-3800 who is the senior sire for Bill and Neva Moore's Minidoka Stables in Hansen, Idaho.

In addition, Simcoe's Chinook has sired the 1961 National Champion two-year old mare, Fade Away N's Baby Doll F-2780, the National Champion winner Tonto Chinook, and is also the sire of Anchor's Wy-

nook F-3610, the 1966 Reserve World Champion Appaloosa Roping Horse.

Storm Cloud F F-1644, sired by Red Eagle, was Maize's second colt for the Forry's and like his full brother Simcoe's Chinook, has proven himself to be an outstanding sire. He was shown in three National Appaloosa Shows, and placed first in his class in two. He sired the filly Simcoe's Skileen 5170 whose sale price of \$3,500 in 1963 tops any price prior to 1968 at a National Appaloosa Horse Sale in the mare division. This mare had been Grand Champion, Champion or Reserve Champion of all breeds eight times prior to being sold. His granddaughter, Simcoe's Skeena. won the Northwest Champion Halter Mare award in 1964, and his Get of Sire entry was undefeated in six Regional Appaloosa Shows in 1966. Storm Cloud F was selected as one of the outstanding stallions to be used by the National Appaloosa Horse Club in the nationwide genetic study. He was selected as "Horse of the Month" by the Western Livestock Journal because of the many
