

winning colts he has sired. One of the best things that can be said of a stallion is that he sires better than he is, and when Storm's colts top him, they are good.

Still other Red Eagle sons that have gone on and made admirable names for themselves are Red Eagle Jr. 4294, a midwest stud and Red Eagle's Guild of the 1001 4902, a 1959 son so named for his likeness to his famous sire in appearance. Guild ended a highly successful showing career by a spectacular win over 74 other stallions to become Grand Champion of the Fall 1963 Appaloosa Breeders Association Show in California. His winning form appeared on the cover of HORSE LOVER'S magazine and is also pictured as representative of the Appaloosa breed in the book HORSEMAN'S BIBLE. Not to be outdone by Guild, American Eagle's picture appears in the beautiful book, HOOFPRIENTS IN TIME which has recorded the families within each breed of horse that have contributed the most to its development and improvement. It couldn't be said any better!

The Red Eagle Breeders Association is a National organization formed for the preservation and promotion of the Red Eagle Bloodline, this the original line established through the efforts of Claude Thompson that brought the Appaloosa breed back from diminishing numbers to its present place of prominence.

Compared to the familiarity and popularity of the Red Eagle Bloodline in California and parts of the Northwest, the need for a breeders association to promote the bloodline in all parts of the United States becomes apparent. It is our aim to reach all breeders, large and small, who have a sincere interest in promoting the Appaloosa breed

through their horses that trace to the foundation sire Red Eagle F-209.

The Red Eagle Breeders Association has the support of the Appaloosa Horse Club from whom is quoted ". . . we too are very interested in seeing breed associations which promote top bloodlines of the Appaloosa develop. An association such as this does much to strengthen the breed and enlighten many people in various areas about the fine qualities of the Appaloosa horse".

Owners of one or more registered Appaloosas that trace by pedigree to Red Eagle through either sire or dam are eligible for membership in the Red Eagle Breeders Association whose purpose is to preserve and promote the Red Eagle Bloodline through members individually planned breeding programs which have the common interest of retaining the superior qualities inherent in the Red Eagle Bloodline.

This can best be achieved through the sincere effort of members to

produce quality Appaloosas from carefully selected Red Eagle breeding stock, keeping in mind that a foal is the sum total of both sire and dam and therefore care should be taken to choose bloodlines that cross well with our breeding stock in order that consistent quality be maintained. The Red Eagle Bloodline, crossed with the Toby Bloodline, produces animals of outstanding conformation and color. Other bloodlines that nick favorably are the Patchy F-416 and Old Tony lines.

A double bred Red Eagle horse is generally one of superb qualities as evidenced by some of the aforementioned horses. It is hoped that the preceding article will be both interesting and informative to those reading it and for those of you interested in securing the services or offspring of Red Eagle stock.
